(1949, Anwar Wagdi, Egypt, b&w, 120 min., starring Layla Murad, Naguib al-Rihani, Anwar Wagdi, Muhammad Abd al-Wahhab, and Yusuf Wahbi) Modeled loosely on popular French theatre with some resemblance to Vaudeville, The Flirtation of Girls is a light-hearted comedy about a frivolous young rich girl falling in and out of love with dizzying speed. When she fails in her studies, an old teacher, Mr. Hamam, is hired to help her pass her exams. Mistaking her flirtatious manner for love, the old teacher quickly falls prey to her charms. Starring five legendary figures in the history of Egyptian cinema, this film is considered one of the best Egyptian musicals ever produced.

Salah and Amina, the troupe's leading dancers, are romantically involved. A series of errors leads them both to believe their love affair is over, jeopardizing the successful completion of the show. In My Father's House

In a startlingly candid portrayal, director Fatima Jebli Ouazzani pursues the importance of the Moroccan tradition of virginity. Employing fictional scenes in which fantasy and poetry



reveal the deeper levels of her quest, Ouazzani goes back in time revealing her grandmother's and mother's marriages at young ages against their wills. The filmmaker herself defied tradition at the age of 18, leaving home and escaping the likelihood of the same kind of oppressive marriage. Against the breathtaking backdrop of a traditional North African wedding, Ouazzani uncovers family secrets, confronts fundamentalist doctrine and dispels prevailing myths about virginity in a moving and complex portrait of three generations of women and the choices they have made — or were denied — and their struggle to find a voice within the confines of their world.
